TIPS FROM THE CONE ZONE

A series of tips from the more successful Solo II drivers for the many less experienced drivers and newbies. Anthony Donofrio graciously agreed to be interviewed.

Name: Anthony Donofrio

Car make/year/class: 2004 Blue Dodge SRT4 / DS

Drive it on street? Daily driver? Yes. In winter, he drives a 1995 Subaru Impreza Wagon

Favorite fan: Mother, Kathy

Membership: SCCA and CNY Club member for three years

Years auto crossing: Two years.

Number of Solo II events last year: Six events.

Other hobbies: Anthony is a full-time student working on an Associates Degree in Humanities at Onondaga Community College.

What do you do in off season? Helps his brother, Mike, work on his Miata.

Most important tip to newbies? Anthony jokingly suggests competing in a class with nobody in it.

Most important thing regarding walking course? Picture yourself behind the wheel of your car and walk the course visualizing it from that perspective.

Best modification made to car to improve performance? A four point racing harness makes a big improvement over stock seat belt shoulder harness. The harness really keeps you "planted" in the car so you can better concentrate on driving.

Between runs? Anthony looks at the times turned in by other experienced racers. He says this helps motivate him / convince him of what's possible.

How do you practice between autocrosses? Anthony plans on doing a track day this year at Watkins Glen.

Left Foot Braker? No.

What do you focus on/think about right before you start a run? He concentrates on getting a good "launch." Getting the rpm's up and dumping the clutch!

What do you focus on /think about right after you finish a run? Anthony claims he mentally reviews his run while he drives back to his parking spot.

Anything different in driving on wet course? He has to be "easier" on the throttle to prevent excessive wheel spin because of the front wheel drive/ high horsepower combination.

Dream ride: A 2005 Lotus Elise, any color will do!

SCCA Club Racing Announces New Entry Level Track Program

TOPEKA, Kan. (Feb. 17, 2005) - The SCCA Club Racing Department has announced a new way for SCCA members and sports car enthusiasts to compete and experience the thrill of road racing with the formation of the Performance Driving Experience (PDE), part of its new Time Trials program.



The PDE, the first of four levels of Time Trials activities (which range from instructional to all-out, top-speed events at venues from closed tracks to paved, non-track roads), offers a chance to improve driving skills while giving curious rookie enthusiasts a taste of competitive motorsports action.

SCCA Club Racing officials believe the new program will help introduce SCCA Club Racing, and motorsports in general, to people who might not have been on the Club's radar before.

"This is the first time Club Racing has expanded its programs to non-traditional areas," SCCA Director of Club Racing Terry Ozment said. "We are very excited about this opportunity for lots of reasons, but especially because it will bring SCCA to a brand new audience."

The new format provides competitive flexibility for motorsports enthusiasts by allowing both street cars and race-prepared vehicles to participate, depending on the program level.

A breakdown of each level:

"Performance Driving Experience" (PDE) - The PDE is the first level of the program and provides an instructional environment for drivers who want to improve driving skills and increase their enjoyment of driving their street vehicle. PDE is SCCA's unique version of "track" or "lapping" days.

"Club Trials" – Club Trials is the second level of the Time Trials program. This level combines elements of PDE instruction with the excitement of running against the clock to determine individual class winners. Cars range from street cars to fully prepared race cars.

"Track Trials" – Track Trials, the third level of the program, offers closed-course track time, and winners are determined by fastest time around the course. Cars prepared for both Solo and Road Racing competition are eligible for Track Trials.

"Hill Climbs" – The fourth and top level of the Time Trials program. Hill Climb events offer short-distance, timed events for race-prepared vehicles on paved mountain roads, with winners determined by fastest times.

NY ROAD RALLY 2005

April 29 – May 1 2005

Binghamton, NY

The Northeast Rally Club is hosting its annual event on 4/29 – 5/1, for the first time in the Binghamton, NY area. It is a TSD (Time/Speed/Distance) Rally in which you drive according to specific course instructions, never over the speed limit, with the goal of accurate driving. It is a weekend of sportsmanship and camaraderie: a driver, a navigator and a car, working together in friendly competition. Meals are shared with other competitors, where you can swap stories and tips and learn from the pros.

You can bring any car: your 1930 Model A, that hopped up 49 Buick or even a 2003 Miata. A handicap is provided to cars built before 1954, to even the odds, but even a 2005 Corvette is welcome. You need no special equipment but an accurate or "factored" speedometer is recommended (rally computers are not allowed). Mandatory rally school is provided on Friday. Rookies compete in a separate class.

Cars leave in 1 minute intervals from a set start point and travel the same course. Instructions are very specific. Surprise checkpoints will note your time and the teams (various classes) with the elapsed time closest to the perfect time win trophies and bragging rights.

"THE NEW ENGLAND CHALLENGE" FOR FORMULA FORD



Announcing "The 2005 New England Challenge" for Formula Ford

The schedule for the 2005 New England Challenge for Formula For d has been finalized and includes eight events over six weekends. The 2005 series builds on the success of the 2003 and 2004 series in which over 50 drivers have participated with an average field of 16 Fords and Club Fords. This is a grassroots effort organized by Bob Lutz of the Steel Cities Region and John Merriman of the New England Region to encourage class growth, raise the competition level amongst the current drivers and provide for social interactions amongst the drivers and crew. Similar to last year, the 2004 series will be run in conjunction with SCCA Regional events, except for the Memorial Day event at Lime Rock Park which will be part of the pro weekend. The only change from 2004 is that the Club Ford / no spec tire class was dropped; only FF and Club Ford with spec tire rule will be eligible for prizes. Club Fords running on soft tires will be grouped with FF for the purposes of NEC points and awards. There have been only 2 or 3 Club Fords in this class the past 2 years and we cannot ask sponsors to keep contributing when participation is not there. Club Fords should continue to register for events according to the Supps for that event; the NEC coordinators, with help from the drivers, will track the Club Ford NEC class. Overall, the 2005 series promises to be bigger and better than last year with similar contingency awards and new support from FormulaCar Magazine.


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
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
