I just smiled and was so glad to have her taking care of me and thankful she was up to it and by the way drove very well.

Thanks CNY Region for the flowers and good wishes. All of that helped me to keep my focus and my spirit racing.

"Move that body", was her battle cry and one day she decided to take me outside and walk me around the neighborhood. WAIVER WORKER INSTRUCTIONS

- 1. Show up on time for your Shift! The person you are relieving may be running in the next group.
- 2. When people pull up to the gate that need to sign waivers, pull them over to the side so the gate is not blocked and other cars may come and go. This is especially important when people are filling out minor waivers or have a lot of people in the car who need to sign.
- 3. Be sure to use both sides of the waiver forms
- 4. It is your responsibility to fill in the Description/Location and date on the top line of both sides of each sheet and sign and print your name and the date at the bottom of both sides of each sheet because you are the person witnessing the signatures.
- 5. The waiver must be signed by each person receiving a wristband even if they have previously signed and want a replacement.
- 6. Tell people that the band should be worn on the upper half of the body and be visible from the front.
- 7. Minor Waivers One form #M2-2 to be used for all "minors" A. Minor waivers for:
- 1. Minor drivers, passengers, course workers (and any other minor) whose official capacity requires him/her to enter a "hot" area, MUST be signed by BOTH parents/legal guardians. "Hot" areas may be defined by the region (in compliance with the applicable SCCA event rules) but must include at a minimum, the course and grid/staging areas. Other minors may be admitted on a per event basis with a waiver signed by one parent/guardian. It is highly recommended that both parents/guardians sign.

- 2. Minor waiver forms may be given out to be executed by the parents/legal guardians away from the event. However, they must be "received" and signed for on the waiver form by an adult SCCA member at an event as part of the registration process. A region may, at its option, require the parents to sign the waiver in the presence of an event official or have the form be notarized.
- 3. Do not have minors sign the adult waiver at an event.

4. Miscellaneous Information

- a) The legal status of a minor's guardians or parents should be verified. If a parent/legal guardian claims to have sole custody or legal guardianship status, then verification should be received before allowing the guardian/parent to execute an annual/multi-event waiver. Such verification might include court papers or, at a minimum, a simple written statement from the parent/legal guardian. It is not acceptable to have anyone other than the minor's parent(s)/legal guardian(s) execute any waiver on behalf of the minor.
- b) "Minors" are defined in almost all states as anyone under 18. A few states may impose a higher age limit. Check with the Risk Management Department or your states' authorities if you are in doubt.
- c) Each region MUST implement an effective waiver retention system. Adult waivers must be retained a minimum of four years. Minor waivers must be retained until one year AFTER the minor reaches the age of majority. Do NOT send annual minor waivers to the National office.

- 8. Sign in for your shift at the information tent to make sure that you receive credit for working.
- 9. All materials should be placed in the guard shack at night to protect them from weather and have them available for the morning shift.
- 10. MTAA and FAA personnel need not sign if they show you a FAA or MTAA ID card.

What do you do in off season? Mostly works and shovels snow

Most important tip to newbies? Talk to other competitors, especially those who drive your type car or who are in your class.

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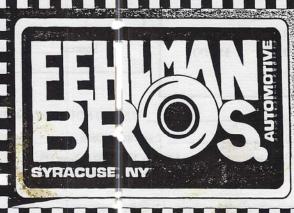


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
